April is Prevent Child Abuse Awareness







From the Desk of Fr. Dan

Hello one and all: Who wants to take an 8-track flashback to my favorite year of 1971? Great! I knew you would. For those who remember, we recall the Coca-Cola jingle, "I'd like to Buy the World a Coke?" Its popularity led to the words being slightly rewritten to be a full length song. Two versions were released: one by the Hillside Singers, studio musicians who collaborated with producer Billy Davis, one of the co-writers of the jingle. The commercial version by the Hillside Singers peaked on the Billboard charts at #13. The other version, that I'm more familiar with, is by The New Seekers. It peaked at #7 on the US charts and eventually sold 12 million copies. The New Seekers were an offshoot of The Seekers, a popular group in the 1960s. They were an Australian folk-pop group with such hits as: Georgy Girl, I'll Never Find a Another You, A World of Our Own, and The Carnival is Over. They were led by the magical voice of Judith Durham. They disbanded in 1968, and one of their members, Keith Potger, formed a new group in the UK and named them The New Seekers. But enough of the backstory, let's get to the lyrics and why I chose this song for the week.

I'd like to buy the world a home and furnish it with love. Grow apple trees, honeybees, snow -white turtle doves.

I'd like to teach the world to sing in perfect harmony. I'd like to hold it in my arms and keep it company.

I'd like to see the world for once all standing hand in hand, and hear them echo through the hills, for peace throughout the land (that's the song I hear) ...

Now, some of us will think this song is a bit too syrupy sweet (Bubblegum pop like) and roll our eyes at the lyrics as too idealistic, and from a different time. It may be a bit syrupy sweet, and it is from a different time, the early '70s. I think - just my opinion - it sings to a heart that longs for peace and harmony in a world that is full of violence and discord. Think of the time that it was written, 1971. What was going on in the world that year, besides great music and me? The war in Vietnam was still raging, the terrorist group, The Weather Underground, bombed the US Capitol building, Idi Amin staged a coup in Uganda to take control of the country, Charles Manson and three others are convicted of the 1969 Tate-LaBianca murders, a lot of stuff. The point is, I think for the most part, we all look back fondly on the past, especially our childhood. In reality, it wasn't all sunshine and lollipops. My childhood was the '70s and the '80s. I do remember them fondly, especially in comparison to what the world is today. In many ways, things have not gotten better but have only gotten worse. So, the desire for a world full of peace and harmony is not just a pie-in-the-sky idea that people will roll their eyes at. (As a side note: I wonder if the pie in the sky could be warm Apple Pie with ice cream,

Our own country seems to be coming apart at the seams, led by certain ideologies, seeking to destroy our country and rebuild it in its own image. That image is frightening. You know what I'm saying since you see it too. I must stay in my own lane as a priest and can't venture in that direction. I'm scared of what this country is becoming. It makes me mad at the same time; it's absolutely disgusting to see. I'll leave it at that.

As the people of God, we need to pray for peace and harmony, a country and planet where we can get along. We can live alongside each other, and not want to kill one another. We should pray for peace and love to win the day and hate, and evil thrown into the abyss. We must stand up to defend our way of life. Don't let the other side take over. We should stand up to aggression. A similar feeling was around when this song was released, the unknown of what was going on in the world and at home and where we were headed at the time. That feeling, a byproduct leftover of the 60s, was one of peace, love and getting along. We still need that in our own time. Jesus calls us to love one another, to love God above all things and to love our neighbor as ourselves. How about the Golden Rule, "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you." If we can live out the Christian mandate as disciples of Jesus, then we can in our small way affect our circle of influence. Hopefully, that reaches out further to others. Will we change the world on our own? Maybe not. Together it's possible. We can hope and dream of a brighter, safer, freer, more loving future for our kids and grandkids if we continue to live as God has called us to. Then maybe we will see a time when the world will stand for once hand in hand and hear the echo throughout the world, for peace throughout the land. That's the song I'd like to hear.
