From the Desk of Father Dan

Hello. Is it me you're looking for? Probably not, but here I am.

We now are entering into the 2nd week of Lent, and hopefully embracing this time of year to draw closer to God in the midst of everything else going on in our lives. Maybe a couple things to consider. These are taken from an interview with Fr. Mike Schmitz of the Diocese of Duluth, MN. He says that we should ask ourselves: "What can I absolutely **not** have in my life if I am going to be the saint God wants me to be?" (Emphasis added). Another question we should ask ourselves is: "What do I need to get rid of in order to be more free to love and serve God?" Maybe another question we could ask ourselves, in what way can I do better in my life to be a 'more gooder' disciple of Jesus? This may be loaded question. It may entail several things, but maybe pick one and work on it.

If you remember last week's article, the topic of America's pastime was addressed in relation to attending an Altoona Curve game this year as a group. In discussing this with a couple of parishioners, they made mention that Mt. Savage produced an MLB player, Bobby Robertson. He played for the Pirates from 1967, 1969-1976 (missed '68 due to a health issue). There was hope he would be another Ralph Kiner due to his prowess in the minor leagues as a homerun hitter, leading the minors in homers three times. Although he made the parent club in '67, it wasn't until 1970 that he broke into the regular lineup playing first base, and he was a good one. He was a member of the 1971 World Series champs, playing alongside Roberto Clemente, Willie Stargell, Bill Mazerowski, Doc Ellis, Steve Blass and others, and playing for Danny Murtaugh.

The years following the magical year of 1971 were not so kind to Bobby, his numbers at the plate paled to what he had done previously even though his defensive skills were still on display. He was released by the Pirates at the end of the '76 season and did not play in '77, but was picked up in '78 by the Seattle Mariners. He played for the Toronto Blue Jays in '79, but was released partway through the season. Bob Prince, Pirates announcer, called Robertson the "Mt. Savage Strongboy." He also said of Robertson, that he could hit a homerun out of any park, even Yellowstone. Robertson was the first player to hit a homerun into the left field upper deck of Three Rivers Stadium. He was born in Frostburg but grew up in Mt. Savage, and now lives in LaVale with his wife Carolyn.

Another player to come from the area (Lonaconing) was Robert "Lefty" Grove. He was born in 1900 and was the son of a coal miner. As a baseball player, he made his professional debut in 1920 with the Martinsburg Mountaineers, Class D, of the Blue Ridge League. Later that season, he was seen by the owner/manager of the Baltimore Orioles (at that time, it was an independent minor league team in the International League). After his contract was bought out, Lefty played with the Orioles and helped them win several league titles. In 1925, his contract was sold to the Philadelphia Athletics of the American League, who were managed by the legendary Connie Mack. He became a 20-game winner for the first time in 1927, and helped the A's win the AL pennant from 1929-1931, winning back-to-back World Series titles in '29 & '30. In 1931, he was chosen as the league MVP, only a handful of pitchers have achieved that distinction. Also, in 1931, he tied Smokey Joe Wood and Walter Johnson with 16 straight wins. After a successful time with the A's, Lefty was traded to the Boston Red Sox. After two subpar seasons, he returned to form in '35 with another 20-win season. 1936 saw Grove win his seventh ERA title. And in his last season, 1941, he won his 300th game, ending his career with a 300-141 record. His overall career ERA was 3.06 and he was enshrined in the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1947.

After his career was over, he returned to small town life in Lonaconing and was elected to the town council in the 1950s. He also operated a bowling alley in town for many years and donated baseball equipment to the local youth teams. Lefty passed away in 1975. A memorial was completed in 2019 so that his memory would not be forgotten, the proud son of Lonaconing.

If you know of any other professional ball players from the area (Mineral, Hampshire, Grant, Garrett or Allegany counties) let me know, I'm curious.

Well, that does it for this week, hope all of you have a good one. Elf on a shelf. Pish posh. What Jesus wants is ewe in a pew. Get it? Think about it.

During this LENT, let us examine our hearts and lives.

Then ask yourself...where do I place
